Computable languages are related to what are usually known as formal languages I avoid using the latter phrase here because later on in the book I distinguish between formal languages and computable languages. In fact computable languages are a special type of formal languages that can be processed in ways considered in this book by computers or rather abstract machines that represent computers. Abstract machines are formal computing devices that we use to investigate properties of real computing devices. The term that is sometimes used to describe abstract machines is automata but that sounds too much like real machines in particular the type of machines we call robots. The logic part of the book considers using different types of formal logic to represent things and reason about them. The logics we consider all play a very important role in computing. They are Boolean logic propositional logic and first order predicate logic FOPL.
