

Maple Tree Life Cycle

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Maple trees are able to reproduce starting around 50 years old. Maple trees reproduce by producing angiosperms, which means they develop seeds within a fruit.

When warmer weather arrives and the snow melts, it's the start of maple tree reproduction. In response to the season change, the maple tree grows leaves.



1. Flowers

As spring progresses, the tree spreads flowers. They come in a variety of colors such as green, yellow, orange and red. Maple trees have two types of flowers. Male flowers have many stamens called stamens. On each stamen is a little knob called an anther. Anthers produce a fine yellow powder called pollen. The pollen lands on female flower stalks called the stigma. New seeds can be formed.



2. Fruit/Samara

Around midsummer, the flowers fall from the tree. In its place, the tree grows fruit. Each female flower makes two seeds. A fruit grows around them. This type of fruit is called a samara. The fruit appears as thin, u-shaped spinners, commonly called helicopters by children. When they are ready, they release and spin towards the ground.



3. Germination

On moist ground, a maple seed germinates and sprouts in just a few days.



4. Seedling

More leaves appear as the seedling grows upward. The leaves create food for the whole plant. New leaves grow from a bud at the very top of the plant.



5. Tree

It takes many years for a maple seedling to become a full-grown tree. Its trunk grows taller and thicker, branches grow from the trunk, twigs grow from the branches, and leaves grow on the twigs.
